Architecture in Nineteenth-Century Photographs Micheline Nilsen, 2017-07-05 Revealing that nineteenth-century photography goes beyond the functional to reflect the aesthetic, intellectual, and cultural concerns of the time, this study proposes that each photographic image of architecture be studied both as a primary visual document and an object of aesthetic inquiry. This multi-faceted approach drives *Architecture in Nineteenth-Century Photographs: Essays on Reading a Collection*. Despite three decades of post-colonial, post-structuralist and gender-conscious criticism, the study of architectural photography continues to privilege technical virtuosity. This volume offers a thematic exploration of the material, and a socio-historical examination that allows consideration of questions that have not been addressed comprehensively before in a single

publication. Themes include exoticism and armchair tourism; the absence of women from architectural photography; the role of photographs as commodities; vernacular architecture and the picturesque; and historic preservation, urban renewal, and nationalism. Micheline Nilsen analyzes photographs from France and England?the two countries where photography was invented?and from around the world, representing a corpus of over 10,000 photographs from the Janos Scholz Collection of Nineteenth-Century Photographs of the Snite Museum of Art at the University of Notre Dame.

Monet Nathalia Brodskaya, 2011-12-22 Claude Monet (Paris, 1840 – Giverny, 1926) Pour Claude Monet, le qualificatif d'impressionniste est toujours resté un sujet de fierté. Malgré tout ce que les critiques ont pu écrire sur son oeuvre, Monet n'a cessé d'être véritablement impressionniste jusqu'à la fin de sa très longue vie. Il l'a été par conviction profonde, et peut-être a-t-il sacrifié à son impressionnisme beaucoup d'autres possibilités que lui offrait son immense talent. Monet n'a pas peint de compositions classiques avec des personnages, il n'est pas devenu portraitiste, bien que tout cela fût compris dans sa formation professionnelle. Il s'est choisi, en

fait, un seul genre, celui du paysage, et il y a atteint un degré de perfection auquel aucun de ses contemporains n'a pu parvenir. Pourtant, le garçonnet avait commencé par dessiner des caricatures. Puis Boudin lui conseilla d'abandonner la caricature et d'opter pour le paysage : c'est que la mer et le ciel, les animaux, les gens et les arbres sont beaux justement dans l'état où les a créés la nature, c'est-à-dire entourés d'air et de lumière. C'est en effet de Boudin que Monet hérita la conviction de l'importance du travail en plein air, conviction qu'il transmit plus tard à ses amis impressionnistes. Monet ne voulut pas entrer à l'École des Beaux-Arts. Il préféra fréquenter une école privée, l'Académie Suisse, fondée par un ancien modèle, quai des Orfèvres, près du pont Saint-Michel. On pouvait y dessiner et peindre un modèle vivant pour une somme modique. C'est là que Monet rencontra le futur impressionniste Camille Pissarro. C'est ensuite dans l'atelier de Gleyre, que Monet rencontra Auguste Renoir, Alfred Sisley et Frédéric Bazille. Il parlait aussi à ses amis d'un autre peintre qu'il avait également trouvé en Normandie. Il s'agissait de l'étonnant Hollandais Jongkind. «Il fut à partir de ce moment mon vrai maître », disait Monet. «C'est à lui que je dois l'éducation définitive de mon oeil ». Ces paysagistes normands, Boudin et Jongkind, se rangent au nombre des maîtres directs des impressionnistes. En 1871-1872, les paysages de Monet ne se distinguaient pas encore par une grande richesse de coloris ; ils rappelaient plutôt les tonalités de la peinture des artistes

de Barbizon ou les marines de Boudin. Il composait une gamme de coloris sur la base de tons marron-jaune et bleu-gris. En 1877, lors de la troisième exposition des impressionnistes, Monet présenta, pour la première fois, une série de tableaux : sept vues de la gare Saint-Lazare. Il les choisit parmi les douze toiles peintes dans la gare. Ce motif, dans l'oeuvre de Monet, est dans la ligne non seulement du Chemin de fer de Manet et de ses propres paysages, avec trains et gare, à Argenteuil, mais aussi de la tendance qui commença à se manifester avec l'apparition des chemins de fer. Un beau matin, il réveilla Renoir avec un cri de victoire : «J'ai trouvé, la gare Saint-Lazare ! Au moment des départs, les fumées des locomotives y sont tellement épaisses qu'on n'y distingue à peu près rien. C'est un enchantement, une véritable féerie ». Il n'avait pas l'intention de peindre la gare Saint-Lazare de mémoire ; il voulait saisir les jeux de lumière du soleil sur les nuages de vapeur qui s'échappaient des locomotives. En 1883, Monet avait acheté une maison dans le village de Giverny, à proximité de la petite ville de Vernon. À Giverny, les séries devinrent une des principales méthodes de travail en plein air de Monet. Quand un journaliste, venu de Vétheuil pour interviewer Monet, lui demanda où se trouvait son atelier, le peintre répondit : «Mon atelier ! Mais je n'ai jamais eu d'atelier, moi, et je ne comprends pas qu'on s'enferme dans une chambre. Pour dessiner, oui, pour peindre, non ». Montrant d'un geste large la Seine, les collines et la silhouette de la petite ville, il déclara : «Voilà mon atelier, à moi » Dès la

dernière décennie du XIXe siècle, Monet commença à aller à Londres. Il commençait tous les tableaux à Londres, d'après nature, mais en terminait beaucoup, ensuite, à Giverny. Un ami de Monet, l'écrivain Octave Mirbeau, écrit que Monet avait accompli un miracle : à l'aide de couleurs, il avait réussi à reconstituer sur la toile une matière quasi insaisissable, à reproduire la lumière solaire, en l'enrichissant d'une quantité infinie de reflets. Claude Monet fut le seul parmi les impressionnistes à avoir mené jusqu'au bout une étude presque scientifique des possibilités de la couleur ; il est peu probable qu'on eût pu aller plus loin dans cette direction.

Manet and Modern Beauty Gloria Groom, 2019-06-25
This stunning examination of the last years of Édouard Manet's life and career is the first book to explore the transformation of his style and subject matter in the 1870s and early 1880s. The name Manet often evokes the provocative, heroically scaled pictures he painted in the 1860s for the Salon, but in the late 1870s and early 1880s the artist produced quite a different body of work: stylish portraits of actresses and demimondaines, luscious still lifes, delicate pastels, intimate watercolors, and impressionistic scenes of suburban gardens and Parisian cafés. Monet, l'œil impressionniste Claude Monet, Musée Marmottan, 2008 - Depuis longtemps on étudie les sources historiques, culturelles, sociales, religieuses et, avec l'art moderne, la subjectivité individuelle, qui guident le regard des peintres. L'œil, et la vision au sens physique, ne forment qu'un filtre, aussi complexe soit-il; mais quand ce filtre défaille, cela affecte à la fois le regard et le geste de l'artiste en altérant la traduction de facteurs « objectifs » comme « subjectifs » dans ses options esthétiques et leurs instruments techniques. Des cas célèbres déjà connus, mais le plus souvent superficiellement, voire en forme de clichés, comme l'astigmatisme d'El Greco ou la cataracte de Claude Monet, ont laissé entrevoir comment un peintre peut vivre et s'adapter à un handicap, le contourner, voire en bénéficier fût-ce sans

intention. Les ophtalmologues se sont depuis longtemps intéressés à cette problématique. La possibilité nous est aussi offerte, de voir comment cet artiste confronté à une perte de capacités dans des facultés directement indispensables à l'exercice de son art s'en est accommodé. Au sommet de son art, dont il avait porté la maîtrise à hauteur de son désir, Monet a été forcé de revoir son approche devant le fait incontournable d'un handicap visuel plus ou moins invalidant. Cela a marqué des limites à son expression; comme tout jeu de contraintes, cela a pu aussi le mener à de nouvelles voies, inattendues. Quelle part des Nymphéas de Monet est due à l'aboutissement d'une démarche entamée une soixantaine d'années plus tôt au Havre ? Certainement la plus grande; mais quelle autre part peut relever de la bataille dans laquelle il était engagé face à sa cataracte, à ses effets anxiogènes, alors qu'il était enfin reconnu et libre dans son désir de laisser à l'éternité un témoignage magistral et irréfragable de sa relation particulière au monde ? Cette exposition essayera avec l'appui des connaissances scientifiques les plus avancées sur la vision, de

nous faire appréhender plus précisément ce qui résume le mieux l'Oeuvre et l'originalité d'un peintre: son regard. L'exposition et le catalogue présenteront une soixantaine d'oeuvres en provenance d'institutions diverses et des collections du musée Marmottan.

Edouard Vuillard Gloria Lynn Groom, Edouard Vuillard, 1993-01-01 Edouard Vuillard (1868-1940), one of the most admired post-impressionist artists, is best-known for his small easel paintings and their charming portrayals of everyday life. However, a major part of his work during his early life was the painting of large decorative panels in the Parisian homes of wealthy private patrons, produced between 1892 and 1912. These panels - some fifty in total - have been little studied, due principally to the inaccessibility of many of them and the impossibility of their being included in exhibitions.

Claude Monet Virginia Spate, 1992 Monet is incontestably one of the greatest Impressionists, as well as being the most popular. Yet hitherto books on this great figure have been partial, concentrating either on aesthetic or on social aspects of his work without attempting a synthesis. The France of Monet's youth and maturity is covered in depth, especially the traumatic legacy of the Franco-Prussian war and the Paris Commune; and his famous garden at Giverny is shown to be both a personal Utopia and a vital part of his creative processes. The dialectic of the real world and its representation in art is explored in detail as manifested in his splendid canvases - faithfully reproduced in over 130 colour plates.
