Analytic Number Theory Chaohua Jia, Kohji Matsumoto, 2013-11-11 From September 13 to 17 in 1999, the First China-Japan Seminar on Number Theory was held in Beijing, China, which was organized by the Institute of Mathematics, Academia Sinica jointly with Department of Mathematics, Peking University. TE:m Japanese Professors and eighteen Chinese Professors attended this seminar. Professor Yuan Wang was the chairman, and Professor Chengbiao

Pan was the vice-chairman. This seminar was planned and prepared by Professor Shigeru Kanemitsu and the first-named editor. Talks covered various research fields including analytic number theory, algebraic number theory, modular forms and transcendental number theory. The Great Wall and acrobatics impressed Japanese visitors. From November 29 to December 3 in 1999, an annual conference on analytic number theory was held in Kyoto, Japan, as one of the conferences supported by Research Institute of Mathematical Sciences (RIMS), Kyoto University. The organizer was the second-named editor. About one hundred Japanese scholars and some foreign visitors coming from China, France, Germany and India attended this conference. Talks covered many branches in number theory. The scenery in Kyoto, Arashiyama Mountain and Katsura River impressed foreign visitors. An informal report of this conference was published as the volume 1160 of Surikaiseki Kenkyusho Kokyuroku (June 2000), published by RIMS, Kyoto University. The present book is the Proceedings of these two conferences, which records mainly some recent progress in number theory in China and Japan and reflects the academic exchanging between China and Japan.

Irregularities of Partitions Gabor Halasz, Vera T. Sos, 2012-12-06 The problem of uniform distribution of sequences initiated by Hardy, Littlewood and Weyl in the 1910's has now become an important part of number theory. This is also true, in relation to combinatorics, of what is called Ramsey theory, a theory of about the same age going back to Schur. Both concern the distribution of sequences of elements in certain collection of subsets. But it was not known until quite recently that the two are closely interweaving bearing fruits for both. At the same time other fields of mathematics, such

as ergodic theory, geometry, information theory, algorithm theory etc. have also joined in. (See the survey articles: V. T. S6s: Irregularities of partitions, Lecture Notes Series 82, London Math. Soc. , Surveys in Combinatorics, 1983, or J. Beck: Irregularities of distributions and combinatorics, Lecture Notes Series 103, London Math. Soc. , Surveys in Combinatorics, 1985.) The meeting held at Fertod, Hungary from the 7th to 11th of July, 1986 was to emphasize this development by bringing together a few people working on different aspects of this circle of problems. Although combinatorics formed the biggest contingent (see papers 2, 3, 6, 7, 13) some number theoretic and analytic aspects (see papers 4, 10, 11, 14) generalization of both (5, 8, 9, 12) as well as irregularities of distribution in the geometric theory of numbers (1), the most important instrument in bringing about the above combination of ideas are also represented.

Analytic Number Theory Bruce C. Berndt, Harold G. Diamond, Adolf J. Hildebrand, 2012-12-06 On May 16 -20, 1995, approximately 150 mathematicians gathered at the Conference Center of the University of Illinois at Allerton Park for an International Conference on Analytic Number Theory. The meeting marked the approaching official retirement of Heini Halberstam from the mathematics faculty of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Professor Halberstam has been at the University since 1980, for 8 years as head of the Department of Mathematics, and has been a leading researcher and teacher in number theory for over forty years. The program included invited one hour lectures by G. Andrews, J. Bourgain, J. M. Deshouillers, H. Halberstam, D. R. Heath-Brown, H. Iwaniec, H. L. Montgomery, R. Murty, C. Pomerance, and R. C. Vaughan, and almost one hundred other talks of varying

lengths. These volumes comprise contributions from most of the principal speakers and from many of the other participants, as well as some papers from mathematicians who were unable to attend. The contents span a broad range of themes from contemporary number theory, with the majority having an analytic flavor.

Women in Numbers Europe III Alina Carmen Cojocaru, Sorina Ionica, Elisa Lorenzo García, 2022-02-01 This volume includes articles spanning several research areas in number theory, such as arithmetic geometry, algebraic number theory, analytic number theory, and applications in cryptography and coding theory. original mathematician Srinivasa Ramanujan arrived in England. Six years of his short life remained to him during which he wrote, amongst other things, five papers and two notes jointly with G.H. Hardy

Diophantine Equations and Inequalities in Algebraic Number Fields Yuan Wang, 2012-12-06 The circle method has its genesis in a paper of Hardy and Ramanujan (see [Hardy 1]) in 1918 concerned with the partition function and the problem of representing numbers as sums of squares. Later, in a series of papers beginning in 1920 entitled some problems of 'partitio numerorum', Hardy and Littlewood (see [Hardy 1]) created and developed systematically a new analytic method, the circle method in additive number theory. The most famous problems in additive number theory, namely Waring's problem and Goldbach's problem, are treated in their papers. The circle method is also called the Hardy-Littlewood method. Waring's problem may be described as follows: For every integer $k \geq 2$, there is a number $s = s(k)$ such that every positive integer N is representable as (1) where X_i are non-negative integers. This assertion was first proved by Hilbert [1] in 1909. Using their powerful circle method, Hardy and Littlewood obtained a deeper result on Waring's problem. They established an asymptotic formula for $rs(N)$, the number of representations of N in the form (1) , namely $k \geq 1$ provided that $8 \leq (k - 2)^2 - 5$. Here

Assigning of values of the prime number counting function to Bernhard Riemann's zeros. Concept of Dirichlet lines in the complex plane William Fidler, 2022-02-02 Academic Paper from the year 2022 in the subject Mathematics - Analysis, grade: 2.00, , language: English, abstract: Given their importance as the building blocks of all of the integers, the prime numbers, their number and disposition within the integers have been studied

for millennia. In 1859 Bernhard Riemann published a short paper (which only extended to six manuscript pages) concerned with an investigation of the number of prime numbers less than any given number. The outcome of the work revolutionised number theory and in the years following has resulted in almost what could be termed an industry in a particular aspect of his work, now called the Riemann Hypothesis. Riemann showed that all the zero values of the zeta function in the positive part of the complex plane should lie in a region between $x = 0$ and $x = 1$, and, in particular, conjectured that they all should lie on the line of symmetry $x = 1/2$. This conjecture, which is the basis of many other conjectures in Number Theory is considered by many mathematicians to be the currently greatest unsolved problem in Mathematics—so much so that the Clay Mathematical Institute of Boston, Mass. has offered one million dollars to anyone who can produce a solution. No attempt is made here to verify the hypothesis, for its validity is not required. A procedure is developed here, by means of which, the zeros of Riemann's zeta function in the so-called Critical Strip of the complex plane may be assigned values of the prime number counting function. The procedure is novel and uses the concept of a Dirichlet line in the complex plane and a quantity called a nearodd (both of which are defined in the text). The process may be rendered self-contained, in the sense that, when it is associated with Gram's series the only input required is the magnitude of the imaginary part of the function $s = x + iy$ which will locate a Riemann zero on the Critical Line; vast numbers of zeros may be accessed in [2]. Further, it is shown that the Riemann conjecture is irrelevant in the assigning of any particular value of the prime number counting function to the corresponding Riemann zero. It is suggested, pace Wiles, who obtained a proof of Fermat's

Last Theorem as a by-product of his verification of the Taniyama-Shimura conjecture, that, in the light of Godel's incompleteness theorems, Riemann's hypothesis may be undecidable.
