El léxico del autor Roland Barthes, 2023-06-01 Escribir sobre lo que he escrito es manifestar fatalmente que estoy condenado a mis propios límites, es hacer públicos esos límites, es asumir una tautología (yo soy soy): pero yo odio la tautología, figura del discurso de la doxa. ¿Un libro mío sobre mis escritos? Imposibilidad reglamentaria de que sea un libro “trascendente”: nunca será otra cosa que un libro más, igual, homogéneo respecto de los demás (esto que, al principio, puede ser sentido como un fracaso, será en realidad la salida de lo Imaginario). En 1972, Roland Barthes recibe una propuesta editorial perturbadora: escribir un libro sobre sí mismo, un ensayo de autocritica que relea treinta años dedicados a pensar su gran aporte a la French Theory: la escritura. Barthes asume el compromiso, pero el honor que acepta un poco infatigado se convierte muy pronto en un proyecto inasible, problemático, que lo inspira como nunca pero lo fastidia también. Con el libro recién bocetado, Barthes duplica la apuesta y transforma el proyecto de libro en el tema de su célebre Seminario de la École pratique des hautes études de 1973-1974. El léxico del autor es el registro de esa experiencia inaudita, que Barthes comparte con una quincena de estudiantes y que poco después desembocará en Roland Barthes por Roland Barthes, verdadero libro-bisagra en su trayectoria. A lo largo del curso, Barthes piensa su libro en voz alta, pone a prueba ideas e hipótesis, discute sus entusiasmos y sus vacilaciones. Como el libro es una extraña versión de autobiografía intelectual, no es solo su pensamiento o su escritura lo que expone; es él mismo, su imaginario de escritor, su intimidad, su cuerpo, sus fantasmas. Así, El léxico del autor es al mismo tiempo la crónica grupal de un libro que se escribe en vivo, el experimento de una introspección a cielo abierto y el ensayo de un modelo de enseñanza utópico, fundado en el deseo y la diferencia, donde el Maestro no transmite otra cosa que el sinuoso work in progress de su práctica y lo que se enseña, en el fondo, no es lo que se repite sino lo que solo sucede una vez. Child Survivors of the Holocaust in Greece Pothiti Hantzoulaki, 2020-11-29 A historical investigation of children's memory of the Holocaust in Greece illustrates that age, generation and geographical background shaped postwar Jewish identities. The examination of children's narratives deposited in the era of digital archives enables an understanding of the age-specific construction of the memory of genocide, which shakes established assumptions about the memory of the Holocaust. In the context of a global Holocaust memory established through testimony archives, the present research constructs a genealogy of the testimonial culture in Greece by framing the rich source of written and oral testimonies in the political discourses and public memory of the aftermath of the Second World War. The testimonies of former hidden children and child survivors of concentration camps illuminate the questions that haunted postwar attempts to reconstruct communities, related to the specific evolution of genocide in Greece and to the rising anti-Semitism of postwar Greece. As an oral history of child survivors of the Holocaust, the book will be of interest to researchers in the fields of the history of childhood, Jewish studies, memory studies and Holocaust and genocide studies.

Glycoproteins II J. Montreuil, J.F.G. Vliegenthart, H. Schachter, 1997-12-08 Part II of this excellent work covers proteoglycans and mucins and deals with many more examples of glycoprotein function. It also covers glycoproteins from four more species (slime mold, snails, fish, batracians). The content of the volume is very comprehensive in that most contributors are focused on discussing, in depth, the wealth of most recent advances in their field, referring to previous reviews of older work for background information. This method effectively produces a very wide subject coverage in a smaller number of chapters/volumes. The volume is an important information source for all glycobiologist researchers (senior investigators, post-doctoral fellows and graduate students), and as a good, comprehensive, reference text for scientists working in the life sciences.

Rods, Sets and Arrows Dirk De Bock, Geert Vanpaemel, 2019-12-10 For anyone interested in the history and effects of the introduction of so-called “Modern Mathematics” (or “Mathématique Moderne,” or “New Mathematics,” etc.) this book, by Dirk De Bock and Geert Vanpaemel, is essential reading. The two authors are experienced and highly qualified Belgian scholars and the book looks carefully at events relating to school mathematics for the period from the end of World War II to 2010. Initially the book focuses on events which helped to define the modern mathematics revolution in Belgium before and during the 1960s. The book does much more than that, however, for it traces the influence of these events on national and international debates during the early phases of the reform. By providing readers with translations into English of relevant sections of key Continental documents outlining the major ideas of leading Continental scholars who contributed to the “Mathématique Moderne” movement, this book makes available to a wide readership, the theoretical, social, and political backdrops of Continental new mathematics reforms. In particular, the book focuses on the contributions made by Belgians such as Paul Libois, Willy Servais, Frédérique Lenger, and Georges Papy. The influence of modern mathematics fell away rapidly in the 1970s, however, and the authors trace the rise and fall, from that time into the 21st century, of a number of other approaches to school mathematics—in Belgium, in other Western European nations, and in North America. In summary, this is an outstanding, landmark publication displaying the fruits of deep scholarship and careful research based on extensive analyses of primary sources.

French Children of the Holocaust Serge Klarsfeld, 1996-10 Features biographical information about 11,400 French children who were deported from France to the Nazi death camps, including their names, faces, and addresses.

Endogenous Toxins, 2 Volume Set Peter J. O'Brien, William Robert Bruce, 2009-12-02 Designed as a first-stop reference for researchers and professionals in toxicology, pharmacology and medicine, this handbook is the very first to tie together the knowledge from many disciplines that has so far been available only from widely dispersed sources in the primary literature. As such, it presents the complete picture on what is currently known about endogenous toxins, including their generation, mode of action, resulting disease condition, and available countermeasures. Clearly divided into four parts, the first systematically covers important toxic molecule species, including metabolic intermediates and reactive oxygen species. Nazi Labour Camps in Paris Jean-Marc Dreyfus, Sarah Gensburger, 2013-12-01 On 18 July 1943, one-hundred and twenty Jews were transported from the concentration camp at Drancy to the Lvitan furniture store building in the middle of Paris. These were the first detainees of three satellite camps (Lvitan, Austerlitz, Bassano) in Paris. Between July 1943 and August 1944, nearly eight hundred prisoners spent a few weeks to a year in one of these buildings, previously been used to store furniture, and were subjected to forced labor. Although the history of the persecution and deportation of France's Jews is well known, the three Parisian satellite camps have been subjected to the silence of both memory and history. This lack of attention by the most authoritative voices on the subject can perhaps be explained by the absence of a collective memory or by the marginal status of the Parisian detainees - the spouses of Aryans, wives of prisoners of war, half-Jews. Still, the Parisian camps did, and continue to this day, lack simple and straightforward descriptions. This book is a much needed study of these camps and is witness to how, sixty years after the events, expressing this memory remains a complex, sometimes painful process, and speaking about it a struggle.
