As early as 2015, reports began to surface alleging that Mr. Kaspersky maintained close ties to Russian spies. Mr. Kaspersky [was] educated at a KGB-sponsored university [and] also wrote code for the Soviet military. While once considered reputable, Kaspersky Lab, its founder and their Russian ties have created a significant risk to U.S. security. According to several media investigations, these connections have allowed Kaspersky Lab to be exploited not only by the Russian government but

also by criminal hackers around the world. Mr. Kaspersky's history and recent remarks have done little to alleviate these concerns. The matter reached a tipping point in July [2017], when the General Services Administration, the GSA, announced the removal of Kaspersky Lab products from its preapproved government contracts schedules. The purpose of this hearing is to examine the concerns raised regarding the risks associated with utilizing Kaspersky Lab products on federal government information technology systems and the federal government's response to the concerns. Witnesses will discuss the government's cybersecurity posture, potential cybersecurity risks Kaspersky Lab's products pose to agency IT systems, and ways to improve agency practices related to design, acquisition, development, modernization, use and performance of federal IT resources.

When cyber operations do produce concessions between rival states, they tend to be part of a larger integrated coercive strategy that combines network intrusions with other traditional forms of statecraft such as military threats, economic sanctions, and diplomacy. The books finds that cyber operations rarely produce concessions in isolation. They are additive instruments that complement traditional statecraft and coercive diplomacy. The book combines an analysis of cyber exchanges between rival states and broader event data on political, military, and economic interactions with case studies on the leading cyber powers: Russia, China, and the United States. The authors investigate cyber strategies in their integrated and isolated contexts, demonstrating that they are useful for maximizing informational asymmetries and disruptions, and thus are important, but limited coercive tools. This empirical foundation allows the authors to explore how leading actors employ cyber strategy and the implications for international relations in the 21st century. While most military plans involving cyber attributes remain highly classified, the authors piece together strategies based on observations of attacks over time and through the policy discussion in unclassified space. The result will be the first broad evaluation of the efficacy of various strategic options in a digital world.

**Inside the Enemy's Computer** Clement Guitton, 2017-08-01 Attribution - tracing those responsible for a cyber attack - is of primary importance when classifying it as a criminal act, an act of war, or an act of terrorism. Three assumptions dominate current thinking: attribution is a technical problem; it is unsolvable; and it is unique. Approaching attribution as a problem forces us to consider it either as solved or unsolved. Yet attribution is far more nuanced, and is best approached as a process in constant flux, driven by judicial and political pressures. In the criminal context, courts must assess the guilt of criminals, mainly based on technical evidence. In the national security context, decision-makers must analyse unreliable and mainly non-technical information in order to identify an enemy of the state. Attribution in both contexts is political: in criminal cases, laws reflect society's prevailing norms and powers; in national security cases, attribution reflects a state's will to maintain, increase or assert its power. However, both processes differ on

many levels. The constraints, which reflect common aspects of many other political issues, constitute the structure of the book: the need for judgement calls, the role of private companies, the standards of evidence, the role of time, and the plausible deniability of attacks.

**Attribution of Advanced Persistent Threats** Timo Steffens, 2020-07-20 An increasing number of countries develop capabilities for cyber-espionage and sabotage. The sheer number of reported network compromises suggests that some of these countries view cyber-means as integral and well-established elements of their strategical toolbox. At the same time the relevance of such attacks for society and politics is also increasing. Digital means were used to influence the US presidential election in 2016, repeatedly led to power outages in Ukraine, and caused economic losses of hundreds of millions of dollars with a malfunctioning ransomware.
