Blue = Nilesa (Swaarupa - Gaseous State -Sri Krishna / Vishnu). Now, when the VIBGYOR is passed through another inverted Prism (Vedas), it again becomes a single White light (Para Brahma). Para Brahma is a particle very similar to God's particle, and from this, Hindus believe that their multiple gods (manifestations/incarnations/Avatar come from.
